EAI and Afterall present a screening of Joan Jonas's 1976 video work, *I Want to Live in the Country (And Other Romances)*, which Morgan's new book explores. Jonas will be present to introduce and talk about this haunting nonlinear video narrative. Following the screening Susan Morgan will lead a Q & A with Joan Jonas. The evening will conclude with a reception during which Morgan's new book will be available for purchase.

The video *I Want to Live in the Country (And Other Romances)* unfolds like a dream as Jonas examines loss, displacement, time, and memory. Jonas creates a poetic theater of meditation in this nimbly structured elliptical narrative. Revealing frames within frames and monitors within monitors, the artist is both the observer and the subject of observation in this murmured story of the unconscious. Susan Morgan describes Jonas's approach to video as a drawing tool, an endless mirror and a framing device. In her new book, Morgan takes the reader through the exterior and interior scenes that comprise Jonas's work and considers how the artist has used performance and video since 1968 to explore ways of seeing, the inherent rhythms of ritual and the archetypal authority of objects and gestures.

Joan Jonas

An acclaimed multi-media performance artist, Joan Jonas is also a major figure in video art. Jonas has performed and exhibited her work extensively throughout the world. In 2004 she was honored with a retrospective at the Queens Museum of Art in New York, entitled *Joan Jonas: Five Works*. She has had major retrospectives at the Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam; Van Abbemuseum, Eindhoven, Holland, and Stadtsgalerie Stuttgart, Stuttgart, Germany. Other one-person exhibitions and performances include the Walker Art Center, Minneapolis; San Francisco Museum of Art; University Art Museum, Berkeley, California; Pat Hearn Gallery, New York, and Yvon Lambert Gallery, New York, among others. Joan Jonas lives and works in New York City.

Susan Morgan

Susan Morgan is a writer based in Los Angeles, California and Edinburgh, Scotland. From 1979-1991 she was, with Thomas Lawson, the co-editor of *Real Life* magazine, an alternative art publication based in New York. A former contributing writer for *Interview*, *Mirabella* and *Elle*, she is currently a contributing editor at *Metropolitan Home*. The author of *Martin Munkacsi* (Aperture, 1992) and *Edward Weston: Portraits* (Aperture, 1995), Morgan is a recipient of the Center for Creative Photography's Ansel Adams Research Fellowship.
