In her videos, photo-texts, performances, installations and writing, Rosler investigates how social realities and political ideologies dominate ordinary life, from the kitchen to the streets and the television set. This video program will include works ranging from the seminal pieces of the 1970s to her complex and provocative works from the 1980s and '90s. A new work, Prototype: God Bless America! (2006), will also be shown.

Rosler's works are in the permanent collections of numerous museums and have been widely exhibited internationally. She has been honored with numerous awards. Rosler's major career retrospective, Positions in the Life World, was exhibited in five European cities and two museums in New York City. Her work will be included in the upcoming Documenta 12 in Kassel, Germany. Rosler lives and works in Brooklyn, New York.
